- ♦ Foucault's work on regimes of visibility sensitizes us to the ways that technological apparatuses can be used as tools for discipline and surveillance.
- ♦ Laura Mulvey's came with the concept of the "male gaze".

Rethinking Researcher Risk

- ♦ Research on the "alt-right is risky and can have negative consequences.
- ♦ Scholars need to be thoughtful and strategic in how they engage with the "alt-right" and its supporters.
